From the desk of Father Corwin...

Whitsunday (also known as Pentecost) is on June 8th this year, and the next morning, we move into the nearly half year-long season sometimes called "Ordinary Times." Or, as a young friend once called it, "The Green Bean Season" because the liturgical color is green, and it is long like a bean.

I truly like Ordinary Time. There are no major holy days (such as Easter, Christmas, etc.) during the next months until November, when we observe Thanksgiving and the season of Advent. That gives us an opportunity to more leisurely and intentionally explore our faith and relationship with Jesus. Without facing a busy calendar looming ahead of us, without rushing from one project to another, we can pause and meditate over some of our most beloved passages from the Bible, or more intentionally pray for others and ourselves.

Beyond that, Ordinary Time, here in the northern hemisphere, means more favorable weather and a chance to get outside. We can get up before dawn and welcome the chorus of birds or go for a short walk then just as twilight settles in, say our 'goodnights' to them. Or, perhaps a walk, even around the block, and intentionally look at the beauty that surrounds us.

The French have tremendous respect for their Flaneurs who set out for a stroll, with no intentional destination nor time to return. They take their time, leisurely looking at people, places, and things, perhaps spending an hour or so to have coffee at an outdoor café, or wandering in and out of shops. They don't rush. They don't have a goal.

We could imitate them, you know, although it might take a few attempts to get comfortable not having a clock or agenda. I encourage you to give it a try, if only because it opens up new possibilities for us to see the goodness that God has placed in our world. Above all, the good people we will see when we go out.

Notes from the May 17, 2025, Vestry meeting.

Treasurer Report

Our general fund looks solid with no outstanding bills.

The question was asked if the memorial contribution for Mary Ann Ferris could be used for altar guild items such as oil candles for the candelabra. Thought will be given.

Sr. Warden Report

The suggestion was made regarding using a little time at Coffee Hour to discuss topics. Also, it is important to practice our policy to give time for thought before taking a final vote on things that will affect the total congregation.

Wendy expressed the positive feeling she had about the Vestry Retreat before the meeting began.

Jr. Warden Report

1. **Signs.** Now that Jim Kauppi is back, Ray will work with Jim and Dan to install the replacement signs at the end of the walks.
2. **Univents.** Ray will change the univents to air conditioning when the weather is warmer for more than a day.
3. **Memorial Garden Tube.** Ethan had checked on a different style tube, but was unable to find what he thought would work.

Rector's Report

Fr. Corwin was unable to attend but sent his thoughts.

1. He gave a thank you to all who worked in the Memorial Garden from the leveling of the statue to the planting of the flowers and vegetables.
2. He asked if the church would have a table for Bridgefest.
3. Jan Meyers' family will have her committal in the Garden at 2pm on June 7, 2025. Earlier that day, there will be a baptism of John and Judy McMahon's great grandchildren.
4. He informed the vestry that Vicky Barber felt she needed to step down from the vestry. A replacement will be needed.

Old Business

A design and cost for the flagpole and pavers will be brought to the Vestry at their June meeting.

Vestry Retreat

The Retreat began with each member sharing what brought them to the Episcopal church.

From there, they shared events that they felt kept the church lively, fulfilling, and/or interesting. Thoughts went to events that helped with spiritual growth, church camp and youth weekends around the diocese, events like the church hayride and pig roast, centering prayer, and community outreach.

Discussion centered on why the church is present in the community but not drawing new members. A suggestion was that we need to be more intentional and inviting.

When discussing how we can create events of a nature that would bring people to church, the first thought was that we need to leave our comfort zones. The "branding" of the church needs to be more visible. We need to learn how to invite others without recruiting them. We are now able to reach different audiences through Facebook and Instagram. We could do some fun dinners and have a service of thanksgiving for specific ministries.

The final question was "Do we *really* want to grow? What does positive growth look like? Members envisioned more children, multi-generations of families, greeters to welcome those who enter on Sundays, and a welcoming presence online at the beginning of each service.

Some calendaring of events was done beginning with participating in Bridgefest in June, inviting others to pie making in July, making a bigger deal of pre-fair pie sales in August, working at the Fair Booth or informing others to stop at the booth in September, a campfire/sing along on the front lawn in October, a Thanksgiving dinner in November, and Santa Shop in December.

The Vestry invites EVERYONE to think about activities that we could do to invite the community.

Celebris Ensemble with Jane Kozhevnikova

Jane left her piano bench to add her lovely alto voice to the festival choir to perform *A Prayer of Jane Austen: Celebrating Jane Austen at 250* that was composed by Jane and Joel Snyder. Jane designed the wonderful string undertones that blended with the choir.

On May 10, 2025, Celebris Ensemble held a special concert at the Bethany Reformed Church in Kalamazoo. The feature of the concert was *A Prayer of Jane Austin: Celebrating Jane Austen at 250*.

The first “Act” highlighted the sound of Celebris and included shorter pieces – *Jubilate Deo* by Orlando Lassus and *Alleluia* by Elaine Hagenberg. These were followed by *April Rain Song*, an absolutely lovely piece by Joel Snyder and Jane Kozhevnikova. *Rise Up, My Love, My Fair One* by Healey Willan was followed by the winner of the Celebris composition competition, *Love is Enough* by Lydia Jane Pugh. The Act was ended with *Jesus, the Sinner’s Friend* by Joel and Jane.

After a short break during which a string ensemble was added along with the Festival Choir, the group presented Joel’s and Jane’s composition of *A Prayer of Jane Austen*. The seven segments bring to music prayers that were discovered in Jane Austen’s diaries. The prayerful compositions were a wonderful meeting of voice and strings. April is Child Abuse Awareness Month

Did you notice the blue flags lining the walkway to Winchester Hall in April? Good Shepherd has worked with Safe Harbor to bring awareness to child abuse for the last few years. Each Flag represents a reported victim of child abuse from the previous year.

Safe Harbor is dedicated to bringing hope and healing to victims of child abuse in Allegan, Barry, and Van Buren Counties, offering free services such as therapy, medical exams, victim advocacy, and child interviews. In 2024, 390 children received support, with 20 benefiting from the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program. To continue this vital work, 15 volunteers are needed to serve Allegan and Van Buren counties. Through classroom presentations, 7,397 children learned how to recognize safe and unsafe touches, while 108 adults received free training to help identify and report abuse. This April, during Child

Abuse Prevention Month, Safe Harbor reinforces its commitment to protecting and empowering children in the community.


With this expanded schedule, the Community Closet remains committed to providing support to those in need. Stop by on either day to see how this dedicated team is making a difference!


